Club 33 welcomed two new members: **Chris Powers**, vice president of CBRE, with 17 years in the commercial real estate business (and a golf handicap hovering around zero); and **Susie Japs**, a proud millennial who is president of Wejungo, a talent strategy and human capital management firm.

President Peter recognized **Glenn Younger** as Rotarian of the Quarter. A member since 2010, Glenn has been active in Girl Scouts, Camp Enterprise, Grotarian and Hoover Interact Committees, and the Membership and Retention committee.

Chair of the day **Ken Andersen**, third generation nurseryman and member since 2000, welcomed the visitor from the longest distance with a little pot from Walter Andersen Nursery (the container kind) and memorabilia from the Maritime Museum, where he is chairman of the board. He introduced its president, **Ray Ashley**, speaker for the day, who presented a lively, humorous one-hour talk in 20 minutes on why the museum decided to build a replica of the San Salvador, the ship Cabrillo sailed north from Mexico to find new lands to claim for Spain.

Ray, an avid sailor since high school with a Ph.D. and a *curricula vitae* longer than the San Salvador, gave a quick history of Juan Rodriguez Cabrillo, the first European to explore the coast of present-day California. He highlighted the history of navigation from Europe in the centuries before Cabrillo when maps were circular, with lands in the middle and a “border of doubt” that no one dared sail across. Some versions had beasts and monsters around the edge where you would encounter bizarre people.

“And they didn’t even know about California at the time,” Ray said.

In the 15th century, more rational maps were created with no mythological symbolism. Systems of navigation evolved and explorers made round trips across the Atlantic. Cabrillo was part of a Spanish expeditionary force that conquered parts of Mexico. He rose through the ranks, had the San Salvador built in Guatemala and headed north to find a route to China. They thought it would be easy. Early maps pictured Japan just off the coast of California, where Catalina is.

Cabrillo arrived on Ballast Point on Sept. 28, 1542, and named it San Miguel. Ray noted he was in the harbor some six days.

“The minimum to have a national monument named after you,” he quipped.

During an attack by hostile natives on Catalina Island, Cabrillo fell and broke his leg; he died on Jan. 3, 1543, from complications. His pilot took over the expedition, eventually returning to Spain. Ray noted that Cabrillo wasn’t a very good navigator; his maps were off by a few degrees. As result, the Spanish explorer Sebastian Vizcaino renamed everything for Spain a century later, including San Diego, and none of Cabrillo’s place names remain.

The San Salvador continued

Despite this, many parks, schools, businesses and points of interest are named for Cabrillo. He certainly made his mark.

There were no designs of the original San Salvador, so the Maritime Museum team scoured old images, designs and wrecks of boats from the same era. They decided to build the ship at Spanish Landing. Some 1.5 million watched it being built.

It took five years to create this “200-ton Steinway piano,” said Ray, since every piece was carved by hand, some using tools from the 17th Century.

The budget was \$6.2 million and they were close, at \$6.4 million, from donations and grants. Volunteers’ donations of time raised the cost to \$11 million. Spanish Landing was a great place to built the San Salvador, but not launch it. It took 12 days, with a house moving company, a 28-wheel computer-controlled trailer and a barge.

“The Maritime Museum volunteers are working on building her interior and rigging her,” Ray said. They anticipate getting Coast Guard certification by the first of the year to take on passengers.

“Why did we do it?” he asked. “The map.”

He is still haunted by the map of a world of determined outcomes, all captive forces, and surrounded by a dark and scary border.

“Every community and organization has to confront that border and sail beyond it,” he said.

Yvonne Larsen closed the meeting with a eulogy for Dan McKinney, club member since 1972 and a great philanthropist, community leader and businessman who died recently at age 96, leaving behind a legacy of good deeds we could all use as a model.

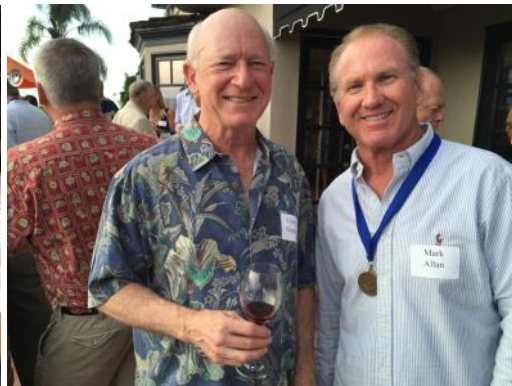
