Ranger Jack in the White House

Peter and accompanied by Suzy Spafford.

Chair of the Day was the effervescent Stephanie Saathoff, president and owner of The Clay Company, legendary government and community relations firm. The San Diego native and SDSU graduate introduced Jack Ford, son of the late President Gerald Ford.

Jack noted he didn't feel offended that it had been 20 years since he was last asked to speak to the club, on the occasion of the 1996 Republican National Convention when San Diego was host city.

He was pleased to return, and led the club through the saga of a 23-year-old college student suddenly moving into the White House. Jack was working as a ranger in Yellowstone when President Nixon resigned and his father became the new President of the United States. Jack was on back country patrol on horseback when he received a radio call to return to the ranger station. A park service helicopter ferried him to the closest airport

for a private plane ride to Salt Lake City and a commercial flight to Washington. On the flight, the pilot replayed the radio broadcast of President Nixon's resignation speech and the long flight gave it some time to sink in.

When he arrived in Washington, the organizers forgot a minor detail – picking him up at the airport. Jack was in ranger clothes and didn't have any money, so he went to Travelers Aid to call for help. He got a ride to his parents' home (they lived in 2400 square-foot house in Alexandria) and spent that evening on the phone calling his buddies to borrow clothes for the ceremony the next day. He secured everything but shoes, hence the photos of him in cowboy boots, long before they were popular.

At the swearing in, the Secret Service outlined his protection plan. He would go from being a casual college kid who enjoyed spontaneity to having 12 to 14 guys following him around.

"Not the way I planned it," he deadpanned. They always required a schedule, such as 20 minutes' notice even when he only wanted to go to a bar and have a beer.

He said even with no social media or cell phones, scrutiny was intense. If he went out to dinner with friends, had drinks or attended a concert, he saw it in the paper the next day. Having a flock of Secret Service agents hovering was the give away.

On the good news side, living in the White House was a single man's dream: unique setting, 24-hour room service, not having to make your bed or clean up your room.

He went back to Yellowstone for duty. When he saddled up to go on patrol, he was joined by 16 Secret Service escorts on horses, ready to go.

The Causes of Wrongful Conviction

Hundreds of innocent people have been released from prison in the United States over the past two decades. By examining the cases, we have learned that common causes of wrongful conviction are false confessions, bad identifications, police and prosecutor misconduct, informant testimony, and poor defense work. Professor Justin Brooks, who has worked in the trenches exonerating clients as the Director of the California Innocence Project, will talk about some of his projects' exonerations and the causes that led to the tragic result of an innocent person serving time in prison for a crime he/she did not commit.

The California Innocence Project is a law school clinic at California Western School of Law in San Diego dedicated to freeing the innocent from prison, training law students, and changing laws and policies to lessen the number of wrongful convictions. The California Innocence Project has freed twenty innocent people from prison, trained hundreds of law students, and changed multiple California laws to improve the justice system.

Ranger Jack in the White House *continued*

“I went from the lone ranger to having a small cavalry,” he said. Since most had zero experience with horses, Jack helped them unsaddle at night and saddle up in the morning.

Back at the White House, Jack enjoyed the perquisites, including riding in Air Force One (a Boeing 707 at the time) and the Marine Corps One helicopter, which was great for going to Camp David for the weekend. His personal guest list included George Harrison, Andy Warhol, Bianca Jagger and Chris Evert. He traveled with his parents to Europe for the Helsinki Accords meetings. More than visiting places, he enjoyed the interactions, new friendships and the knowledge he gained.

The Presidential campaign was a big part of President Ford’s last year of office in 1976. Jack spent many nights in small towns and did more speeches than his dad, including trying to build support on college campuses. He appeared on Meet the Press the last Sunday before the election—at age 24, the youngest guest in the show’s history.

President Ford lost to President Jimmy Carter in a tight election (and Carter lost four years later to Ronald Reagan in a landslide).

After the election, Jack moved to San Diego County where he was publisher of a weekly Del Mar community paper and later served four terms on the Del Mar Fair Board. In 1985, he started a company to provide a variety of services to the shopping center industry. The company, [InfospaceUSA](#), is based in Oceanside and now has 500 employees and clients all over the country.

During the Q&A session, Jack responded to questions about the pressures of the Presidential office (“enormous”) and the differences in politics over the past 40 years. He said campaigns had more dignity when his father went through it. And in a comment on shifting priorities and stances on the issues:

“I think candidates today reflect society but don’t shape it,” he said, to a round of applause.
