Alzheimer's Disease On Trial

Alzheimer's is the most expensive disease in the U.S. today and is skyrocketing at a rate of no other disease. More than 5 million Americans are living with Alzheimer's or another dementia and more than 60.000 San Diegans currently face the disease. Researchers now know that Alzheimer's disease develops 15 to 20 years before a person begins to experience a noticeable decline in memory and thinking. Dr. Paul Aisen of UCSD, will be leading an unprecedented \$100 million clinical research trial focused on preventing the disease in people who currently show no signs of memory loss. Come learn about one of the largest and most anticipated Alzheimer's drug studies that is about to begin right here in San Diego.

Economic Forecast continued

Linda encourages staying with corporate giants like Apple, Amazon and Coke. She does not feel the Feds will raise rates if inflation remains moderate. Overall she believes that 2014 will be as good as or better than 2013.

Bill's comments were focused on looking forward while noting that interest rates have been at record lows with a low 2% inflation for decades. He advised that if Congress finds a way to cooperate it would have a significant boost. He speculates that Obamacare may collapse under its own weight. Large corporations sitting on cash do not want to earn 1% interest rates and will be finding creative ways to invest for larger returns. "2014 looks as good if not better than 2013."

Bert has made the annual call to Don Bauder in Colorado: He predicts a bull market continuation, that utilities, pharma and oil will be the go-to stocks, and that we should 'shoot the monkey.' (Many of us remember Hugh Carter's monkey that threw darts at a stock board and made amazingly good predictions!) Bert quoted Don as saying "Gold is bought out of fear and there is no reason to own it... You can't eat it [and] you are throwing money away." Linda agrees.

Real estate is either feast or famine and both agree that the panic has subsided. Key to U.S. economic progress will be in the development of technology which we export to the world.

Yearly predictions of where the Dow will be in one year: Bill thinks 18,500; Linda, 17,500; and Don Bauder astonishingly believes the Dow will hit 18,000. The high altitude must be causing him to mellow.

Linda says to look for VFCorp and Coca Cola stocks to do well. Bill advises Amazon and Yahoo.

Happy investing! It looks like the new year is off to a good start. And remember..."It is better to be vaguely right than precisely wrong."
