last time by **Jessop's Jewelers**, who will be soon closing their doors and are in the midst of their last holiday sale.

President Bob Russell welcomed our visitors to the club on this "wintery San Diego day," which received a lot of chuckles since the temperature outside was hot due to the blistering Santa Ana winds.

President Bob said that the Grotarian event at the Timken was fantastic, with 60 people in attendance. Thanks to those who made it happen.

Roger Haines took a fine announcing an opportunity to join him, along with Camille Newbern, Will Newbern, and Walter Lam for a once-in-a-lifetime African safari trip scheduled for April 19 - May 8, 2018.

President Bob then gave the Rotarian of the Quarter Award to "the hardest working person in our club. Period." Congratulations to **Daniel Amaro**, who, by the way, has only been in our club for less than 2 years. What a model Rotarian!

Doug Arbon took to the stage to announce this year's MacLaggan Award recipient. The award began in 1990 to recognize those who exemplifies their involvement with humanitarian service and outreach for children. This year's recipient is **Bink Cook**, as her contributions to children have been numerous and profound.

We learned that our Chair of the Day Erin Zlotnik, has visited over 200 independent bookstores throughout the country, and is currently working on her master's degree at USD.

It was then time for our speaker of the day, John Ohanian, President and CEO of 2-1-1 San Diego and former member of our club, to give his presentation.

Editor's note: how uncanny that we got to learn about 2-1-1 the day the Lilac fire broke out in North County. John informed us at the meeting about the fire, way before we had heard about it on the news. Later that evening you could see John on the news at the press conferences along with city officials giving evacuation and emergency assistance information. The news reported that operators answered more than 12,000 phone calls during a 24-hour period between noon on Thursday, Dec. 7, and noon on Friday, Dec. 8. In comparison, on a normal day, typical call volume is approximately 1,000 to 1,200.

2-1-1 San Diego serves San Diego and Imperial County and its mission is simple: "connecting the unconnected." 2-1-1 is a free, 24-hour confidential phone service and searchable online database.

Here's some fun San Diego facts to consider: We have a population of 3.5 million (which is a larger than Connecticut); we are the 5th largest US county with 18 tribal nations and 42 school districts; we are diverse with over 100 languages spoken; we boast a large military presence; we have the largest refugee resettlement site in California; and we have the busiest international border crossing in the world.

John gave us a helpful tip/public service announcement: download the SD Emergency App, which contains disaster preparedness information, interactive checklists to help you to create your emergency plan and build an emergency supplies kit. When disaster strikes, the SD Emergency App will keep you and your family informed with emergency updates, interactive emergency maps, and shelter locations. Download by going to readysandiego.org/SDEmergencyApp.

2-1-1 by the numbers:

- 400,000 connections/year
- 1200+ services providers
- 200+ languages offered
- 92% customer satisfaction
- 140+ highly trained staff\$12 million annual budget
- 501(C)(3) organization
- 1000's of volunteers

There are many ways in which 2-1-1 San Diego helps the community. One is Food Benefits and Enrollment, which provides families and children the food and nutrition they need.

Courage to Call is a program for Veterans that provides our returning military the services they need, or provides them with access to assistance they may not even know is available to them.

2-1-1 helps get the right information out to the right people. Because they speak to the community and their concerns, they are in the privileged position to inform the authorities what the public is concerned about.

2-1-1 has created a software called CIE (Community Information Exchange) which is similar to sharing medical records through HIPAA. This program exchange of an individual's information helps better serve the public at large. This software is having a dramatic impact on the social service sector and has developed a risk rating scale measuring those seeking social services in housing, food and nutrition, and transportation. The rating scale uses categories such as "in crisis, critical, vulnerable, stable, safe, or thriving." 2-1-1 will be rolling this software out nationally to help even more people even outside of San Diego.

Thank you to 2-1-1 San Diego for serving our community to make it a better place to live—for everyone.

CAMP ENTERPRISE-LEGACY APPLICATIONS

Step 2: Confirm nominee can attend the entire duration of Camp from Marcy 15-1, 2018

Step 3: Obtain permission from nominee's school to miss two days of school.

Step 4: Fill out the nominee information form and send to Christy White no later than January 19, 2018

<u>Step 5:</u> Ensure student has a ride to our Rotary meeting on Thursday, March 15. (Camp Enterprise Student Chair will confirm nominee's spot in Camp)
