We received the lovely news that Reality Changers has selected our club as a 2018 honoree for the Reality Changers 100. Next up, was a doozie of a fine bestowed upon the beloved and infinitely fashionable Nancy Scott. We then got to meet our newest ing with our own fearless lead- members, Toni Giffin and Rob Strasberg, before Chris Yanov officially began his role as Chair of the Day. Chris has his own presidential history, meeting four U.S. presidents personally, in addition to our guest. (There was also a how-the-heck-didhe-do-that? moment when we learned that he earned four college degrees in five years!)

> After bestowing gifts on the two visiting Rotarians from furthest away (a coin flip determined which one got the very special presidential prize), Chris introduced our guest, former President of Mexico Vicente Fox. President Fox appeared on the big screen, as he joined us through the wonders of Skype. He gave his perspective and speaking points on a number of topics, including the following:

- **NAFTA:** He believes that the U.S.. Mexico and Canada can use their combined capacity to function as the center of the world, leading global change with compassion, democracy and freedom. He believes NAFTA is the most powerful way to achieve this, and also believes NAFTA will keep the U.S. economy strong.
- Mexican economy: He talked about his belief that building a strong middle class, filled with a society that is mature, knowledgeable, and has sufficient income, is critical to a true democracy. He said that NAFTA and other partnerships with the U.S. have helped 70% of Mexico's population of 130 million become middle class.
- **Immigration:** He believes the immigration issue is an economic one. He says NAFTA and other strategies have considerably increased the income of people in Mexico, which has reversed the immigration trend, leading many originally from Mexico to leave the U.S. and return home. He also repeated sentiments from many other interviews, where he criticized the current Trump administration, saying he believed a wall would not work and that Mexico will not pay for it.

Every year over 20 international youth musicians between the ages of 15-22 visit San Diego for three weeks to perform with our own top rated San Diego Youth Symphony. Rotarians are needed to provide housing to the students during their 3-week stay. This is a wonderful opportunity to make a difference in a young person's life, introduce them to San Diego (often its their first time to the US!), and bring music and international culture into your home. The Host Families are supported with transportation to and from rehearsals and, if needed, concerts. Fellow District Rotarians provide them with parties, surfing, zoo and Sea World trips. As a Host Family, you are invited to rehearsals, fellowships with other Rotarians and their international youth students, and all concerts. Students arrive approximately July 14th and depart August 5th. Related to the point above, both President Fox and Chris Yanov were excited to announce a new foreign exchange program to help low-income youth on both sides of the border. As part of this program, high school students from Reality Changes will take a class at Centro Fox, the first presidential library in Mexico, and students living in poverty near the library will come to UCSD for a three-week program.

Following President Fox's remarks, President Bob got us ready for next week by reminding us about another important youth program, the Four-Way Test Speech District Finals, which will take place at next week's meeting. Come, be inspired, and get to hear who wins by the end of the meeting!

President Bob then closed the meeting with his own remarks, taken from singer Luke Bryan: "I believe this world ain't half as bad as it looks...I believe most people are good."

A perfectly presidential way to end, if there ever was one.

Here is another story about how Camp Enterprise offers life-changing experiences...even for Rotaracts! Thanks to **Solveig Deuprey** for sharing.

Max Louie, a SDSU Rotaract, volunteered to help at Camp Enterprise for two years in a row. Max wanted to go to law school. Specifically, Max wanted to go to USD School of Law. He was insecure and uncertain whether he was smart enough or good enough to be accepted. With a little encouragement and some advocacy from me, he got in.

The article referenced in his email below explains the international moot court competition in which Max and his team were involved. They traveled to Hong Kong to compete in one of the most difficult and prestigious contests in the world. There were 126 teams, and Max's team was one of only five U.S. teams to make it to the final round of 32. This was the highest placement that any USD team had previously achieved.


