Pres nominee **Chris Sichel** was recognized as the Most Admired CEO for charitable organization for the 2nd year in a row. **Patti Roscoe** received the LEAD San Diego Neil Morgan Memorial Award for Lifetime Achievement, which recognizes Patti as someone who has served as a catalyst for positive change. However, fame comes with price, pointed out President Russell, and fined each of them \$350.

Observed in the crowd: **Mike Caruso** gave **Nancy Scott** his piggy bank filled with coins from home to help pay off her \$710,000 fine. Ha!

Jan McDonough received her first Paul Harris Fellow, a special recognition from President Bob and her fellow 4-Way Test Speech Committee members as a thank you for her service.

Presented by our own Paul Hartley III, the Capt. Paul J. Hartley, Jr. Membership Development Award is given annually to a member for the most people brought in to the club for membership. The recipient of this award this year was presented to Trevor Blair. "I could have predicted that one! Well deserved!"—overheard in the audience.

President Bob reminisced about July 2017, when he became the 108th Club 33 President to be sworn in. President **John Morrell** scooted out early in that meeting. Today, President Bob fined John \$350 for leaving early.

President Bob recounted the past year's accomplishments, highlighting giving \$300K for hurricane relief, \$400K to N. Uganda and over 60K meals boxed and sent to the Dominican Republic (with the help of several other organizations). We fulfilled Rotary International President Ian Riseley's challenge for every Rotary club to make a difference by planting a tree for each of its members, in which our club planted over 500 trees planted in the Safari Park. Rotary International succeeded in this goal, with the planting of a total of 1.2 million trees worldwide! (You can read the rest of Bob's year-end message on pages 4 and 5.) President Bob then introduce our Chair of the Day, **Sylvia DuBeau**, who in turn introduced Jaime Quient and Cierra Robinson, our speakers of the day.

Jamie Quient is the President and Managing Attorney of Free to Thrive, a nonprofit organization that empowers survivors of human trafficking to be free from exploitation and thrive by providing them with legal services and connections to additional support. Prior to launching Free to Thrive in 2017, Jamie practiced civil litigation for five years at Procopio, Cory, Hargreaves & Savitch LLP.

Cierra M.Robinson, CEO of Inspired Innovation and sex-trafficking survivor then told her story of being able to turn her trauma into triumph with the gift of higher education. She majored in Psychology at San Diego City College, is a published author and a social justice advocate for victims of human trafficking. She told us the story of how the court system labeled her a monster and a danger to the community. The DA asked for the maximum sentence, 12 years, even though there wasn't a prior prison record. Nobody seemed to care about the trauma she endured, the beatings, starving for food, risking her life.

Instead of treating her or others like her with empathy, she was labeled as a criminal and given few options to change. After her release from incarceration and with a felony record, she found it hard to reestablish herself in society.

Jaimie went on to say that women like Cierra are leaders in community and want to turn their trauma into something good. Unfortunately, there were no legal services for people like Cierra, which is why she started her company. Jamie spoke of the barriers resulting from criminalization of human trafficking victims, namely employment opportunities, obtaining student loans, housing and public benefits. The impact is humiliation, embarrassment, revictimization, financial vulnerability and immigration issues.

The good news is we have come a long way. There has been a shift in perspective for sex traffic workers from criminals to victims. We have more education, awareness, programs and help for the survivors. San Diego has even designated a special court specifically for child sex trafficking victims.

Free to Thrive is a mobile legal clinic, where victims feel safe and comfortable, which is what they need in order to help them achieve their goals. Free to Thrive acts as their advocate, to work with their public defender to help them understand their experience, like seeking restitution and bringing charges to their abuser. She also helps them through name changes which gives them mental freedom and a fresh start.

We all have a role to play through advocacy, awareness education and survivor support and can all help by being an advocate for change, like changing laws to help the survivors.

Sex trafficking is an \$810M business annually, and the 2nd largest criminal industry right after drugs. Jamie said there's anywhere between 3,000 to 8,000 victims a year in San Diego alone. Advice to parents is to stay on top of your child's technology, as the internet and apps like Facebook, Snapchat and Instagram are the primary way of stalking new recruits. Monitor their text messages from time to time, and if they have more than one phone that should be a giant red flag, so utilize your parental controls.

This is a story of supply + demand, so if more people stopped demanding for commercial sex and exploited labor, the less demand there would be for sex traffickers.


icant contributions to make that effort successful.


