We were finally called to order. Ellis Smith gave a very heart-warming inspirational message that spoke to friends and friendships and their importance in our lives. It was a touching reminder of the third of our Four Way Test – Will it build goodwill and better friendships. We saluted our Flag, remembering how fortunate we are to live free. Thanks to Bryan Verhoye and the Club 33 **Singers** for guiding us through *American* the Beautiful. Thank you to President Elect David Oates and Stalwart Communications for sponsoring the News this week. In keeping with her promise last week, President Suzy has included an Art & Music Moment in each week's agenda. A beautiful watercolor painting, Sloop Bermuda, by Winslow Homer appeared on the big screen. She spoke of its beautiful brush strokes, use of color, light, and shadows. Thanks, Suzy, for introducing a weekly infusion of arts and culture into our programs.

Chair of the Day **Wes Wilmers** presented our two visiting Rotarians, all the way from the La Jolla Triangle Club, with a potpourri of gifts to share. Wes introduced Carl DeMaio. Mr. DeMaio hosts a daily radio show on NewsRadio 600 KOGO and is the Chairman of Reform California, a grassroots movement working to repeal the gas tax and tackle state -wide fiscal reform policy.

His message was a simple one. He agreed that Californian is blessed with both an abundance of asset and self-inflicted problems and feels our State politicians and bureaucrats are not keeping promises made. People are leaving California due to our cost-of-living, high taxes, mandated fees, staunch regulations, poor housing decisions, and an out-of-control homeless population. He quoted s \$779 per year per person increase in home budgets if Prop 6 isn't repealed. He warned funds are being diverted to areas in transportation and light rail, even with ridership loss to Uber and Lyft. Ridership is down while overhead remains high, with promised high-speed rail decades away. His solution is to repeal Prop 6. As legislation, Prop. 6 would require voter approval for fuel and vehicle taxes and apply retroactively to 2017, effectively eliminating taxes and fees enacted through the Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017, also known as SB 1. 
