Club 33's Ms. San Diego 2018, Patti Roscoe, joined Scott McGaugh to describe the past, present and future of San Diego's iconic USS MIDWAY Museum. What a fascinating and relevant program!

Chair of the Day **Roy Bell** played an important role in

saving USS MIDWAY (CV-41) from the scrapyard in the 1990s. Patti told how visionary community leaders invested their time, talent, and personal treasure to bring USS MIDWAY to Navy Pier on January 10, 2004. Overcoming an alphabet soup of agencies, entitlements, and naysayers--including NAVSEA, EIR, NERD, SDCC, SDUPD, CCC, EPA and SECNAV--forty-one generous "Plankowners" (including Patti and Scott) spent twelve years fighting for what is now "Midway Magic."

Among the entertaining stories Patti shared: At one very long and contentious public hearing, a concerned citizen complained that the MIDWAY would spoil the view from her condo. City Councilman Harry Mathis responded in exasperation, "Lady, the Midway will **be** the view."

USS MIDWAY Museum's Marketing Director Scott McGaugh described the herculean efforts to meet an impossible deadline: open the museum in 6 months. No sewer lines, no electricity, no elevators! Then Scott anchored with the happy ending: USS MIDWAY Museum is successful and profitable beyond anyone's dreams. Trip Advisor ranks it the #5 most popular museum (of 35,000) in America, visited by 1.4 million guests per year.

The USS MIDWAY Museum Foundation boasts \$42 million assets. Eight hundred volunteers have donated 250,000 hours to maintain the ship and restore its 31 aircraft. From countless special events to hosting NCAA basketball games and *American Idol*, USS MIDWAY Museum is a San Diego treasure. Thank you, Patti and Scott, for your tireless leadership.

Other highlights:

- Peace Committee Chair **Jenni Prisk** presented our club's annual Peace Awards to *Generate Hope* and *Free to Thrive*, local agencies that advocate for 6,000 Human Trafficking victims. They recover "one life at a time." Human trafficking is a sad and shocking \$810 million industry in our community. *You can read more about this year's honorees on page 3*.
- Kids are back in school now so Katie Sawyer inspired us with lessons from childhood.
- For her weekly art talk, President Suzy Spafford used Life Magazine's 1945 VJ Day cover featuring a sailor kissing a nurse in Times Square. Photojournalist Alfred Eisenstadt's historic "Unconditional Surrender" is replicated in super-scale public art at San Diego's Tuna Harbor Park.

2018 PEACE AWARDS

This year, the Peace Committee chose to honor the fight against Human Trafficking with our 2018 Peace Awards because of the scourge it has become in our community.

GenerateHope

There are 5000 sex trafficked victims on San Diego streets every year and thus far, GenerateHope has sheltered 106 survivors.

GenerateHope was founded in 2009 by Susan Munsey. The non-profit provides long-term, comprehensive housing, recovery, and transition programs for young women ages 18 and above who have survived the complex traumas of sex trafficking. GenerateHope help these women to reintegrate into society and walk powerfully into their future.

It's the first and only on-site, integrated recovery program for survivors in San Diego. Ninety-one percent of its funding is from private individuals, foundations and corporate sponsors. They have a staff of fourteen. Their mantra: "we don't just get girls off the streets; we give them everything they need to stay off."

Jamie Quient, Free to Thrive

Jamie founded Free to Thrive in 2017. Prior to the nonprofit organization's founding, Jamie was an associate attorney at Procopio, Cory, Hargreaves & Savitch LLP during which time she launched Lawyers Club of San Diego Human Trafficking Collaborative. Jamie is now the President and Managing Attorney of the Free to Thrive Legal Clinic, the first of its kind in San Diego County to provide comprehensive, holistic and trauma-informed legal services to female, male and transgender victims and survivors of human trafficking. The Clinic collaborates with social service providers, law enforcement, government agencies, law students and firms, and academics. The organization is funded by the County of San Diego and private foundations. Free to Thrive served 100 clients in its first year.



New borehole at Kabaale Sanje Secondary School



In cooperation with the local non-profit Quench and Connect, Club 33 helped to fund a new borehole on the campus of Kabaale Sanje Secondary School in the Rakai District of southern Uganda, near the border with Tanzania. This school is the largest in the district with nearly 3,000 students enrolled who come from mostly poor farming families. It is the largest school to ever receive a borehole from Quench and Connect. The need for clean water was especially urgent at this high school!

In September 2016, this part of Uganda was struck by a 5.9 magnitude earthquake and hundreds and hundreds of homes were destroyed in the region. The struggle for the local families is still great as they try to rebuild. The boarding students at Kabaale Sanje Secondary School had to travel 4 kilometers from campus to fetch water from an open well that is freely accessed by animals. The incidence of cholera was high, and students at this school suffered from intestinal diseases since they had only this contaminated source for drinking water.

Now, with the new borehole right on campus, 3,000 students can drink clean water and are healthy to study. The \$4,500 grant for the borehole was initiated by **Ramona Walker** and approved through the Club's annual Project Allocation (PAC) process.
