The Chamber also serves Mexico, specifically Baja and Tijuana on a daily basis. The Chamber has members in Mexico and is the only bi-national chamber in the nation. San Diego is unique in the cross-border business we share with Mexico. Chamber VP Paola Avila, the 1st woman to chair the Border Trade Alliance, is working closely with the Mexican government and the cross-border region.

There is now a Young Professionals program, with 300 members ages 21-41 years old, linking the next generation of leadership to the business community.

The Policy Leadership Institute is a yearlong course to train business people to run for office, become politically active and.

Did you know that LEAD has merged with the Chamber? Together the two organizations work seamlessly, offering a diverse suite of programs designed to mobilize leaders by enhancing knowledge of key regional issues, strengthening personal leadership skills and establishing strong community connections.

Two years ago, the Chamber started a Women's Leadership Institute called "Advance", a yearlong course to elevate women's careers to the highest levels in the workforce through training and mentoring.

This year's priorities include housing, which is critical here in San Diego and California as a whole. From a business perspective, businesses are hurt by the lack of housing, dealing with commuting and ultimately attracting and retaining key employees.

The Chamber is working alongside SDSU and Prop G, working with a coalition of people to see the development of Mission Valley come to fruition. Sanders believes this will positively affect the San Diego region by allowing SDSU to expand and innovate.

As the leading voice for business, the Chamber is committed to making San Diego the most business-friendly region in California. As the largest member-supported business organization in San Diego's binational region, the Chamber rallies the political clout of the business community and serves as the region's leading policy advocate on critical business issues.
