Bird Watching

While some members were checking the PGA Tour website on their smart phones for the latest from the Farmers Insurance Open at Torrey Pines, the Club 33 program rolled along with precision: Inspirational Moment by Barbara Noerenberg; Pledge and singing of *America* led by

Solveig Deuprey, accompanied by Greg Zinser; News delivered by Mark Burgess, sponsored by Ray McKewon; and new member, Kelly Smith, giving highlights on how she arrived at Point Loma Nazarene University from the wilds of New York.

President Suzy levied a fine against Lauren Lek, Head of the Academy of Our Lady of Peace, who was pleased to announce a major gift of \$2 million from Darlene Shiley to support their STEM teaching programs (science, technology, engineering, math).

Chair of the Day Caitlin Root introduced Kyndell Gaglio from the government partnership team at Bird, one of the electric scooter sharing companies that have been opening in major cities and on campuses all over the U.S. Gaglio said the use of scooters can ease congestion in crowded cities, reduce pollution and add another form of transportation to complement existing systems, such as transit and trolley.

industry as a "last-mile" option. Some 500,000 have ridden Bird in San Diego, including some 20 Rotarians who raised their hands when asked about any users in the audience.

Users download an application to their smart phone. Each user must take a picture of a driver's license to prove they are over 18 years old, the legal age for riding, and provide credit card information to pay for future rides.

The electric scooters have GPS connections and the app shows the locations of the nearest scooters. To unlock, riders scan the code on the scooter screen with their smart phone. It costs \$1 to unlock and riders then pay 15

cents per-minute to ride. Bird has a program to waive the \$1 fee for veterans. When the ride is over, users tap a button on the scooter with their phone and take a picture of the scooter to ensure it is being placed in a safe location.

Bird is just over one year old and is in more than 100 cities. The scooters have logged more than 14 million miles, Gaglio said. This has saved some 12.7 million pounds of carbon dioxide emissions, or the equivalent of taking 1,200 cars off the road. The growth has not been without its problems, including people leaving scooters in unsafe places and blocking sidewalks.

To help solve these issues, the company started a Bird Watcher program. Their fleet of humans is out every day to remove Birds from trouble spots and put them in safe areas. They take them in for maintenance and charging. Charging the scooters has become a growing small business, generating some \$25 million in revenues so far to individuals who have signed up to be independent charging resources in San Diego.

Bird recently rolled out its new Community Mode to report issues directly to Bird. Users can scan the code on the scooter. Bird knows who had the scooter last and can deal with possible consequences.

This reporting, Gaglio said, can help en-Gaglio positioned the electric vehicle sharing courage smart, responsible safety practices. Bird will use reports of poorly parked vehicles to reposition vehicles so they are parked correctly. Similarly, reports of damaged vehicles will ensure those Birds are no longer available on the map for riding. Mechanics in the area will be notified to remove the damaged vehicles to be repaired.

> Gaglio said Bird hosts regular safety panels and attends community events to promote safe riding. The company has ceased late night operations and works with each community it serves to govern speed limits. She said they are challenging other operators to do the same.

> "We can lose market share late at night, but that's fine," she said. Continued on page 2

Bird shares its user data with the cities it serves so traffic experts can analyze the patterns and see if local system adjustments might be made to improve local mobility.

During the Q&A session, Rotarians worried about scooter riders cutting across lanes, running through intersections, riding on sidewalks and exhibiting other unsafe behaviors. She said she shared the frustrations and the scooter industry is trying to be more educational. Bird wants the community to let the company know when there are issues. A lot of this is trial and error, with a new industry, and she expects the system to see continuous improvement, which includes taking bad drivers off.

Over time, people will learn the rules of the road. Scooter use will become more accessible and integrated into how we travel, help us get out of the car culture and stop paying for parking.

"It is also fun to ride!" she said.
