Leaving all of us with a renewed appreciation for and commitment to our Club's Camp Enterprise, Paul introduced our keynote speaker, Martin Cooper, an American Engineer who is a pioneer in the wireless communications industry and radio spectrum management.

For those of us... which is just about everyone... who carry what used to be referred to as a "handheld" cell phone, Mr. Cooper is the one you have to thank. Some of us will remember the first cell phones as vehicle-installed only and about the size of a lunchbox. Reception, power and battery life were definitely sucky. Those became quite popular in the very early 80's. But you might also recall the first handheld cell phone, produced by Motorola in 1983. They were slate-grey in color, shaped like a modestly sized walkie-talkie, and were the great grandfather to the tiny powerful devices we all now carry. Mr. Cooper's genius led the development team at Motorola that produced that first phone. Holding 11 patents, he also holds the distinction of being the first person in history to make a handheld cellular phone call in public.

Mr. Cooper challenged our new and constantly developing technology to solve some our most complex problems. For most of us, our lives seem to move along quickly... technology moves even faster!

On Saturday, March 16, 2019, we lost 34-year Club member and former Club President, Dick Troncone. Dick was a great Rotarian, as well as a proud SDSU alum and Sigma Alpha Eplison (SAE) fraternity supporter. (SAE had awarded Dick its highest honor, Honorary Eminent Supreme Archon.)


To me, Dick was a friend and mentor. He was the acting Executive Director when I was hired in the Fall of 2013, and in that role, he taught me much about the Club, its traditions and culture. He very much respected the traditions of the Club, and felt it important that they be considered as we moved forward.

During our frequent lunch outings, we would discuss the challenges that Rotary faced and how to best plan for the future. He knew the importance of creating a more vibrant Club and of bringing in younger members. At the same time, he wanted to respect the more important traditions of the Club, and deeply felt that we needed to maintain a balance. He helped me to appreciate the importance of some of those traditions, and he helped to shape the YoPro program. In fact, he became a sponsor of new YoPro members as he saw the value that they add to the Club. More recently, Dick agreed to serve on our Foundation Board where he actively supported a number of new initiatives, including the annual Presidential Grant program.

While Dick served on many committees, what captured his passion the most was the Cesar Chavez Elementary School Reader program. He was involved as a reader for more than a decade. Imagine the lives that he touched over that time. He would glow with a smile when he related how the students would greet him with cheers and yells when he entered the room. He made sure that every student who participated in the readers program received a book of their own at the end of the year.

Dick meant much to me personally and I am ever thankful for his support. What I will remember most is the joy he found by reading with the students. This is emblematic of what Club members do every day--quietly following their passion through any number of Club committees to make a difference in the lives that they touch. Not looking for any special notoriety or acknowledgement, but knowing that what they do is important. Dick will be missed but his legacy will live on. Rest In Peace, my friend, knowing that you made a difference.
