One of America's top thought leaders and expert on grief literacy, Ken Druck invited us to ask ourselves, "What can I do looking and living forward to aging?" He says, regardless of your stage in life, you should "face in" to the issues of aging. Clearly a positive and edifying message, Ken

challenged each of us to look in the mirror and defy the natural desire to look younger. Instead, celebrate those facial creases and bald spots that represent valuable life experiences and wisdom. Ken anchored his presentation with a tender story about his 97-year old mother verbalizing her love for Ken. That very moment, he pledged to open his "receiver" to take in precious messages of love. 

The Class has completed 6,757 community service hours within our program, which is a record for our students, and those hours do not include hours they served as leaders in their school clubs and sports!
