Thanks to Price Philanthropies for their largess in donating \$700,000, monies used for muchneeded programs at Hoover. With the help of his teachers, his family, Interact teammates, Club 33 Rotarians, and hard work on his part, Julio is now entering his senior year with a 3.4GPA and evaluating colleges for next year. On Friday, 13 November 2015, an unthinkable thing happened in Paris – a series of ISIS terrorist attacks. One struck during an American rock and roll band concert at Le Bataclan Theatre, taking the lives of 89 people and wounding over 300. Terrorists, wielding automatic rifles, grenades, and suicide vests, stormed the unsuspecting audience. Two other attacks in Paris that night killed a total of 129 people. Our guest speaker, Ferry Zandvliet, was among the 1,500 concertgoers' survivors at the theatre.

Ferry's homeland is the Netherlands. For him and many, this was a life-changing event from which he still suffers chronic insomnia, hyper-alertness, anxiety and serious PTSS from his "night from hell."

Ferry is in his early 40's but remembers those few days with vivid alacrity. When asked if he ever watches other terrorist attacks that happen on a regular basis around the globe, he responded no. He's working hard on his PTSD and those visuals would bring memories flooding back. When asked how he escaped, he said his brain went into a reptilian mode; one of a primal need to find a safe place. He crawled over bodies to get out of the building and helped other when he could. Once on the street, a total stranger offered him shelter in her home, which he gratefully accepted. The borders were closed, so his options were limited. Plus, no one knew how many more attacks could occur at any time.

Ferry decided he wanted to meet the father of one of the bombers, and he did. He formed a friendship with the old man. In their first encounter, Ferry realized they were both refugees, but from different sides of the disaster. The father, a simple man whose own son had blown himself up the night of the attacks, could not grasp what had happened. Ferry developed an intense kinship with this man and could feel the healing helping him. On a negative side, Ferry received death threats because others felt he should not be consorting with a person they considered an "enemy." Ferry downplayed those because he knew this relationship was part of his healing process.

Ferry has gone through extensive counseling and knows telling his story is a form of healing, but also a way to let others hear how fragile life can be. This terrifying ordeal has made him a much softer and happier person than he could have ever imagined. He feels it was a setback, just like everyone had setbacks. He's channeled his anger into his own spiritual journey and enrichment of his life. Ferry now is on the speaking circuit. Club 33 being his largest audience to date. His toughest questions come from kids, who know no boundaries. He surrounds himself with positive, friendly people, and there is a warm and palpable inner calm about him. What a privilege to hear his story. Let's end with his own words...

"I have started a support group for victims of terrorism in the Netherlands; have taken steps to improve the treatment of victims (something that was not there for us at the time) and am sharing this story. This has grown naturally. Talking about what happened gave me much support in terms of processing my emotions in the beginning. I hope that people realize that it is senseless to give in to fear and anger through my story; you end up limiting yourself... I should know!"
