In The Spirit Of Things

Next Meeting

Different types of spirits were everywhere for Club 33 this past Thursday, Halloween Day, with costumed Rotarians scaring their neighbors throughout the room and two distillers on stage touting locally made rums, gins, bourbons and other distilled beverages.

To start: the Inspirational Moment by Richard Cox.; Pledge of Allegiance and America the Beautiful, led by the Club 33 Singers, accompanied by Bryan Verhoye; a Happy Birthday for Natasha Josefowitz; News by Stan Lawrence, sponsored by Ben Wood; an update on the Dec. 5 auction from Kimberley Layton; a call for holiday singers from Solveig Deuprey; new member, Eric Beste was introduced; and Chair of the Day, Trevor Blair, was honored as Rotarian of the Quarter for his many accomplishments for Club 33 (including his visiting of all 133 craft breweries in San Diego.)

Trever touted his approach to "de-tox so he can re-tox," before introducing our speakers: Bill Rogers, of <u>Liberty Call</u> distilling; and Geoff Longenecker, of <u>Seven Caves Spirits</u>.

Geoff noted that he was a native of New Orleans and a recovering lawyer (your investigative reporter followed up to learn he went to Tulane, moved to San Diego after law school when he married a local girl, and began practicing estate and trust and contracts law)

His started his distillery, Seven Caves, in 2016 as a 2,000 square foot grain-to glass distillery and tasting room in Miramar. It specializes in small batch, barrel-aged rums using sugar and molasses sourced from a 100+ year old farm in Geoff's home state, Louisiana. Seven Caves also produces gin distilled with fresh, local botanicals and takes cares to use local and high quality ingredients whenever possible.

He outlined his approach to rum. Commercial rums get 25 to 50 grams of sugar added per bottle, which changes the flavor. Seven Caves doesn't add sugar and the rum tastes

more like a fine bourbon, he said.

Geoff (a former commodore of Southwestern Yacht Club, our investigative reporter learned) likened the distillery scene to the early days of the craft beer industry in San Diego, with brewers experimenting with new styles, such as Stone with a hop-heavy beer. It took off, as did all the other India Pala Ale (IPA) style beers issued locally.

As with new beers, the challenges for local distillers are to get people to try the booze and it can't be bad, Geoff said. He has purchased some expensive spirits from others and had to throw a lot of it away. "It has to be delicious," he said.

Bill Rogers, a Coronado native, secured his craft spirits license in 2014. He named his firm Liberty Call Distilling to reflect his Navy connections the spirit of those who enjoyed having a liberty call – going ashore to have a good time. He has grown from 800 to 6,000 square feet in Spring Valley and makes some 20 different products, including private label spirits made for companies who sell all over the U.S.

His products include: San Diego County gin, spiced rum, white rum, old Ironside single malt whiskey, Constitution bourbon, special reserve small batch straight bourbon whiskey, and a special version in a sand curved bottle for \$89. He has hired a chef and does specialty dinners at his facility in Spring Valley, which includes a barrel house.

Liberty Call can sell directly to consumers, but the license limits it to three bottles per person per day and one cocktail. Not many people will come to Spring Valley for one cocktail, he noted. So he is working on plans to open a new facility in Barrio Logan with a full kitchen, which enables them to sell unlimited quantities. He has struggled with permitting for two years to get the new facility open, hopefully early next year. He said he could go on for two hours on how difficult it is to get licenses and permits for anything in San Diego, with a six-month approval process typical.

The big brands dominate, as evidenced by finding the same products in the same places on shelves in different supermarkets (pay for placement).

For those interest in sampling local spirits, Geoff and Bill mentioned the first San Diego Craft Distillers Guild Fest scheduled from 6 to 10 p.m. on Nov. 16 in Building 177 at Liberty Station. The event includes cocktail and spirit samples, appetizers from local restaurants, music from a jazz ensemble and a speakeasy VIP bar. 


Not to worry if you missed Bring Your Wine to Rotary Day for the auction.
