It was a colorful (dress blues to camouflage) and buttoned-down crowd as Club 33 saluted the military in advance of Veterans Day on Monday, Nov. 11. Members of every branch joined us for lunch, setting good examples with great postures, body fat approaching zero, and perfect

To get us started: Inspirational Moment by Mark Burgess; National Anthem by the Marine Band, San Diego; Doug Taber, Chair of the Day, led a moment of silence for the fallen warriors; Simona Valanciute reminded us about the upcoming Warm Clothes Drive, and asked for donations to be brought to the next meeting (find the wish list on page 3); and Beatriz Valencia gave a us short slide show on the Hoover Youth Exchange program this past summer, with kids enjoying new cultures in foreign countries throughout the world, from Romania to Italy, from Hungary to Finland and from Czech Republic to Slovakia.

Veterans in the audience were asked to stand and be recognized, with a big Navy contingent, followed by Marines, Army, Coast Guard and Air Force.

Doug introduced Sergeant Major Roland McGinnis, The United States Marine Corps (USMC), head of Wounded Warriors Battalion - West, at Camp Pendleton. The Regiment provides and enables assistance to the wounded, ill and injured Marines, sailors attached to or in support of Marine units, and their family members in order to assist them as they return to duty or transition to civilian life.

McGinnis said some 7,000 military men and women had been killed in the line of duty the past 20 years. Members of the armed forces make sacrifices every day for the freedom of our country. Each member has a continuous commitment to protect our honor, rights and our freedoms, he said.

Our armed forces are the most respected in the world. The fundamental qualities, no matter which branch, include courage, pride, integrity and working for causes larger than themselves. The challenges are many, including being separated from their loved ones.

Americans tend to just recognize the veterans on special occasions, such as Veterans Day, he said, although active duty and reserved are representing us 365 days a year. Instead of saying "thank you for your service," he recommended saying "thank you for your sacrifices."

His battalion is providing recovery support for the most critically wounded and injured. In some cases, they are treating injuries that can't be seen from Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD). The battalion provides services for 90 days after transitioning out of military service and prepares them for meeting with Veteran's Affairs and other organizations.

Reservist Marines have stepped up as coordinators to help those who might have what McGinnis referred to several times as a "dark day." The battalion held a job fair last month with 150 organizations and 73 marines and sailors left that day with a job offer. They operate Wounded Warrior call centers for all service members and it's available 24-7, he said. The goal is to make those veterans better tomorrow than they were today. "It takes a nation to take care of our veterans," he said.

In answer to a question about what percent of service members leaving the military need support, he was clear: "100 percent."

Transition is important and can be difficult. His wife had 10 years in the Marines, got her undergraduate degree and certificate and still struggled to get a phone call for the next opportunity after becoming a civilian. When she got a master's degree, some told her she was over-qualified. "I never heard of such nonsense," he said.

Next Meeting: November 14

USCG Captain Timothy Barelli

Capt. Timothy J. Barelli, the new Sector San Diego commander, arrived from Coast Guard headquarters in Washington, D.C., where he served as the deputy director of emerging policy. He was responsible for developing service-wide strategy and advising the commandant and senior leaders on major issues. Of particular note, he crafted the Coast Guard's Strategic Plan for 2018-2022 and the Maritime Commerce Strategic Outlook - the Service's 10-year strategy to promote \$4.6 trillion in annual maritime commerce and protect and modernize the nation's critical maritime infrastructure.

CAPT Barelli will provide a snapshot of operations Coast Guardsmen and women at Sector San Diego conduct locally and around the world. He will talk about the scope of Coast Guard missions and responsibilities and specifically what our engagement is in the San Diego community. In 2019, Sector San Diego has conducted roughly 650 cases ranging from search and rescue, to maritime law enforcement, to vessel safety and pollution response.

He sees young Marines and sailors depart the service every day and he urged everyone to be ready to lend a helping hand. Many making the transition aren't humble enough to ask for help, although he believes everyone needs it in some way.

"We seldom see anything about those who are struggling with invisible injuries," he said. "PTSD is just like any other injury; it's treatable and manageable."

Cost: \$40 per person Registration closes on Nov 27 so sign up now!


