• Symphony Performance and Event Venue: a permanent center at the Embarcadero Marina Park South. One spiffy feature is that the dome of the venue will change shape based on the performing act. (First performances expected summer 2020.)

- Portside Pier: transformation of the flagship waterfront restaurant site along the North Embarcadero, providing lots of dining options from The Brigantine Inc. (including gelato!) as well as free public access to first-rate views. (Current anticipated opening mid-2020.)
- Tenth Avenue Marine Terminal: major public works project to support our cargo business, utilizing modern, clean and efficient technology that allows for less pollutants and more business.
- **Seaport Village Redo**: updating of the 70 acres of land and water in the Central Embarcadero area, to include new beaches, a canal, and open space. (Construction over the next 5-7 years).
- Airport Terminal One: intended to provide a much-needed, major redevelopment of this terminal, though the price tag is high (keep an eye out for a ballot prop). (Construction may begin as early as next year.)

With so many projects happening along the Port's 34 miles of bayfront, Garry showed us that the Port is committed to creating a Renaissance that is as good for our residents, tourists, environment and economy as possible.


