Next Meeting

Mark Maloney, Rotary International President 2019-2020, had the tight schedule of a political candidate during his latest visit to San Diego as chair of the annual International Assembly for newly elected district governors.

It was his 15th time attending the Governor con-

ference and he had meetings all over the region. He was introduced by Marta Knight, District 5340 Governor, who provided highlights on Mark's involvement with Rotary since he joined in 1980 in Decatur, Alabama.

Mark praised Club 33 and the other clubs in District 5340 for their dedication to generating results across the border and around the world. He said Rotary has 1.2 million inspired women and men, who have come to Rotary with the goal of building a better world.

Mark said that "Rotary Connects the World" is more than his slogan. It describes how and why Rotarians can achieve so much.

"All of us share the vision of a better world and Rotary allows us to connect with each other, in deep and meaningful ways, across our differences," Mark said. "We are people of action—people who not only want to change the world, but also have the ability to turn inspiration into real and lasting change."

Our connections span the globe—bridging cultural, linguistic, generational, and geographic barriers. To build on that, Rotary is currently rolling out a new five-year action plan with four major goals: :increasing our impact, expanding our reach, enhancing participant engagement, and increasing our ability to adapt.

Our action plan is about getting results. He cited Polio eradication as a proven model to build on in pursuit of the plan's first goal: Increasing Our Impact.

"Rotary will return to the polio model in pursuit of our audacious goals: educating the world's children, ensuring equitable access to water and sanitation, helping local economies grow sustainably, and so much more," Mark said.

The second goal: <u>expanding our</u> <u>reach</u>. This includes reaching out to new members, engaging current members, and

creating more alternatives for membership for the next generation of Rotarians.

Third: enhancing participant engagement. Mark said this includes building a more family-friendly Rotary -- one that welcomes children to our activities and that is considerate of families in our scheduling.

The final priority: <u>increasing our ability to adapt</u>. This means finding new ways to lead the world to lasting change and with different generations joining the charge.

"We are ready to seek out fresh opportunities, create more paths to leadership, open up our conversations to diverse voices, and simplify how we operate with confidence," he said.

Mark said Rotary will be connecting to the world in more ways through its ties with the United Nations and the common goals. In 2020, the UN is marking the 75th anniversary of the signing of the UN charter. Rotary is hosting a number of special events in addition to our annual UN Day, including presidential conferences in Paris and Rome, and a final celebration just before the convention in Honolulu.

This relationship with the United Nations is but one example of how, together, Rotary can serve the world.

"Alone, we cannot provide clean water for all; alone, we cannot eliminate hunger; alone, we cannot eradicate polio," he said. "But together? Of course we can."

"The connections are yours. The service is yours. And Rotary's impact on the world is up to you."

During the Q&A, Mark provided an update on polio eradication, with cases climbing in Afghanistan and India because of immunization issues. With the help of Rotary, the tide has been turned and India had just one case in the last year. Africa has had no new cases of wild virus polio since 2016.

He provided other examples of Rotary's connection globally: in Guatemala, where Rotary is providing a social safety net that the government can't provide (nutrition, food, creating a bakery business for women); rebuilding schools in Japan near Fukushima; and surgery for kids with cleft palates in Vietnam (similar to what
