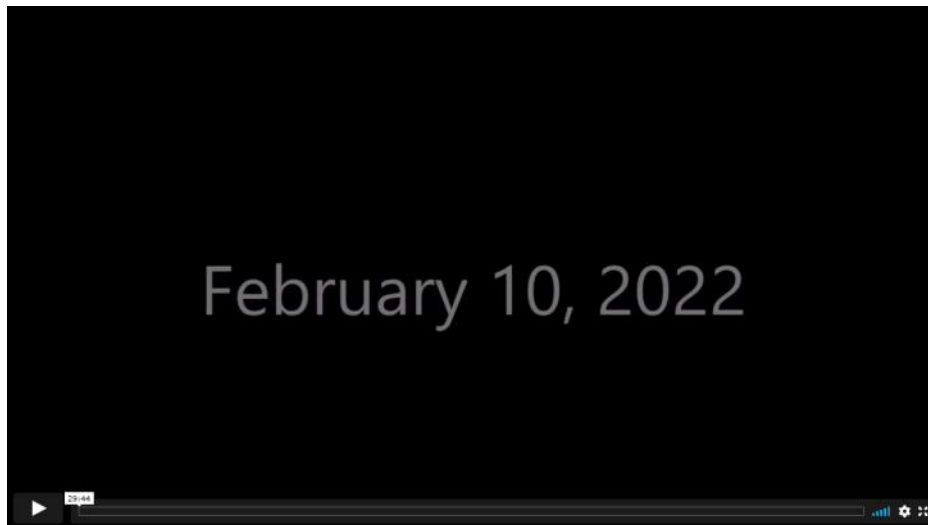




At the request of our Feb. 10 guest speaker, Nick Canepa, his portion of the program was not recorded.

The Wrench House helped assemble and deliver the bikes on February 8 to the delight of the families receiving them. Price Philanthropies-2021 MacLaggan/Frye Award Recipient

“Each year, the James MacLaggan Award is given to a person who has dedicated their lives to the care of children.” For our new Rotarians, that is how Dr. Fred Frye, since 1991, introduced the MacLaggan Award honoring fellow Rotarian and Pediatrician Jim MacLaggan.

The 2020 year award was deferred by the MacLaggan Award Committee due to COVID but was not forgotten. In a Zoom Virtual Rotary meeting at Fred’s bedside, it was announced that we would be appending his recent “Mr. San Diego Award” name to the MacLaggan Award, making it the MacLaggan/Frye Award.

The now, first MacLaggan/Frye Award has another first, it honors not one person who has cared for our children in an outstanding manner, but now honors a multigenerational organization, Price Philanthropies.

Although Price Philanthropies was conceived by an iconic business genius, Sol Price, we are not just recognizing his wisdom and compassion, but also a multigenerational foundation that has been guided and sustained by the Price family. Price Philanthropies is appropriately named a foundation, because it is the bedrock of a philanthropic support that is beyond the scope of any one person.

We Rotarians know about the incredible transformations of Hoover High School students participating in Cardinals Interact, a Rotary and Hoover partnership funded by Price Philanthropies. The impact of that esteemed project alone would be worthy of the MacLaggan/Frye Award.

Price focuses upon the underserved of San Diego, particularly the diverse City Heights area, where it seems that just about every beneficial partnership has the Price fingerprints on it. (For example: Copley-Price Family YMCA, Urban Village, School in the Park, Rosa Parks Parent Center, College Ave Compact, Price Family Scholarships (to name a few).

But Price Philanthropies encompasses a greater area of SD County because we have the powerful, catalytic Leadership Awards: Aaron Price Fellowships. (Of which ~2,000 have been awarded). And the philanthropy programs have expanded Internationally to Latin America and the Caribbean with “Aprender y Crecer” (Learning and Growing). Whereby Books & School Supplies have been distributed to 120,000 students, ~ 6,000 teachers and 200 Primary schools.

The extent of the philanthropy, the goodness emanating from the template of this Foundation is staggering, I am just in awe.

No one person, only a family, could conceive of, and implement the breadth of this effective altruism, this targeted “goodness”, and I believe no one family has done more for the children of our community, and could be more deserving of the MacLaggan/Frye Award, than the Price Philanthropies. Congratulations.
